All times listed above area approximate and subject to change according to the number of exhibits in each area. Member/Adult Conduct: The use of or having possession of alcoholic beverages or controlled drugs at any South Dakota 4-H event will result in automatic expulsion from the event.

Meade County Fair General Rules

- 1. Upon arriving on Thursday, July 24th, **each exhibitor will need to obtain a number and provide a mailing address along with a phone number.** After obtaining an exhibitor number proceed to the various departments. All entries in departments H, I and J must be entered Thursday, July 24th between 4-7pm. **Only 1 entry per lot number.**
- 2. All livestock will need to be checked in at the Meade County Fair Barn between 7:30am to 9:30am on Friday, July 25th and will need to be vet inspected. A veterinarian will be on site for inspection from 7:30am 9:30am. There will be a \$5 vet fee per family (doesn't matter if you have 1 animal or 25). Each exhibitor will need to obtain a number and provide a mailing address and a phone number at the livestock check-in table. Penalty for not complying with the above time is that you will forfeit your premium money and/or will not be able to participate in the 4-H Premium Livestock Sale.
- 3. All animals will be staying overnight on Friday night at the fair barn and security will be provided. The only animals that can be checked in on Saturday are calves still nursing or unweaned on the cows. These animals will need to provide a vet inspection prior to unloading. All companion animals will be released on Friday.
- 4. If you are showing any livestock you will need to provide your own feed and bring your own equipment to clean up after your animal.
- 5. All 4-H exhibits shall follow exhibit list and rules in the 2025 State Fair Book 4-H Division. 4-H exhibits entered in a 4-H class are not eligible to show in open class competition. Animal Exhibitors will not be able to show the same animal in 4-H/FFA and in Open Class. You will have to have a different animal for each class.
- 6. Every entry must be in the name of the bona fide owner of animal or article entered.
- 7. All livestock entries must be halter broke to show. Exhibitors must inform themselves when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the show ring promptly after being called. Exhibitors must wear their exhibitor number where it is visible to the judge.
- 8. Every effort shall be made by the fair department superintendents to secure competent judges. Decisions on awards are entirely those of the judges and shall be considered final.
- 9. Every precaution will be taken for the safekeeping of animals and articles after they are in their proper places, but the Meade County Fair will not be responsible for any loss or damage or injury to any exhibit that may be lost or destroyed or in any way damaged. Likewise, the Meade County Fair will not be responsible for accidents or loss of property by fire, theft, wind, etc.
- 10. Release of exhibits: All Static Exhibits and Livestock will be released on Saturday, July 26th after the Pie Auction.

If exhibits removed before said time ribbons, premium and prize money will be forfeited. All department heads will report any exhibits leaving early.

11. Premium money will be available and distributed at the same time exhibits are released for departments A-I (in exhibit area).

12. Age divisions for all Static Exhibits:

- 13. **Entries:** Can have unlimited entries, but only allow **1 entry per Lot Number.**
- 14. **Camping:** Camping during the fair is available for 4H/fair board and FFA members and their families on fair grounds. No fires allowed, no utilities available. Generators are allowed. You must check in with fair board to be instructed on camping location.

PREMIUM AWARDS

- 1. Ribbons will be awarded according to the quality of the exhibit when there is no competition.
- 2. Three ribbons may be given in each lot in open class exhibits. A blue ribbon shall denote a first place, red ribbon a second place and a white ribbon a third place.
- 3. All premiums shall be paid at the fair on the last day.
- 4. All the indoor exhibits that are awarded a ribbon will receive a premium and that premium can be picked up with exhibit. Premiums: First-\$3, Second-\$2 and Third-\$1.
- 5. Large Animal Livestock Premiums: First-\$5, Second-\$4, Third-\$3. Small Animal Livestock Premiums: First-\$3, Second-\$2, Third-\$1. All livestock premiums will be at the Fair Office.
- 6. No checks will be paid by the Meade County Fair Association if over 60 days have gone by since the date of the check was issued. 7. Payout: Any one person/number can only receive a max of \$50 in premium payout money with Livestock Premium included in this.

4-H Livestock Sale Rules

Animals eligible to sell will be: Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Rabbits, Goats and Poultry. You may sell 2 animals - one per species - open to 4H members only.

Department A - Beef Cattle

Entry Fee: \$2.00 per head. Vet Fee: \$5.00 per family. Entries close at 9:30am on Friday, July 25th. All entries must be registered at the fair barn.

All cattle occupying pens or stalls must be entered for competition and shown in their respective classes. Entries must specify owner's name and address and the animal's age, sex and breed or description with a full pedigree and registration number. Bulls, cows and herds entered as such must be owned by individual or firm exhibiting them.

An animal can only be registered in one lot. No exhibitor may exhibit more than two animals in one lot.

No animal with hereditary unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums.

English Breed Crossbred animals must be from a 100% English Breed Sire and a 100% English Breed Dam. This includes either straight-bred or crossbred sire or dam. English Breeds are: Hereford, Angus, Devon, Longhorn and Galloway.

All Sheep and Goats exhibited at any county fair or the SD State Fair must have official USDA premise of origin tags in the sheep's ear and listed on the Health Certificate. Sheep and goats that do not comply will be denied entrance to the show.

Docking tails on Sheep – Should have at least (1) vertebrae of tail left. Wool Breeds should be shorn in calendar year but not slick shorn. This is to show the quality of their wool.

An animal may only be registered in one lot. No exhibitor may exhibit more than two animals in one lot. All sheep occupying pens or stalls must be entered for competition and shown in their respective classes. Entries must specify owner's name and address, the age, sex and breed of description with a full pedigree and registration number of the animal being shown. No animal with hereditary unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums. All market lambs must be shorn.

The Meade County Fair Association will not be held responsible for any illness or death resulting from exhibition at the Meade County Fair.

Swine exhibited at the County Fair shall be free from contagious and communicable disease. All swine occupying pens or stalls must be entered for competition and shown in their respective classes. No swine with hereditary unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums. No swine shall be entered in the name of any other than the BONAFIDE owner (s).

Entries close at 8:30am on Friday, July 25th. All entries must be registered at the fair barn.

All rabbits and companion animals occupying cages must be entered in their respective classes. Animals must be transported and housed in cages or carriers at all times when not being judged. Entries must specify owner's name and address and the animal's age, sex and breed or description. Animals entered as such must be owned by individual exhibiting them. An animal can only be registered in one Lot No. Exhibitor may exhibit no more than two animals in one lot.

No animal with heredity unsoundness will be allowed to compete for premiums. All companion animals on grounds must be at least 4 weeks of age or older. Rabbits should be at least 8 weeks of age to be shown.

POULTRY/WATERFOUL/RARE BIRDS SPECIFIC RULES:

- 1. Poultry entries must be registered at the fair barn from 8 to 10am, vet will be present during that time for vet inspection.
- 2. Entries will be accepted in any pure breed. Non-recognized breeds will need to provide the standard to be judged by.
- 3. Decisions are entirely of the judge and are FINAL.
- 4. All entries are expected for follow SD Animal Industrial board standards for Pullorum testing.
- 5. Vet Inspection required for entries before entering the barn. Unless a CVI has been issued within 30 days.
- 6. Bird showing symptoms of illness when received or during the show will be sent home this is at the discretion of the Vet or Poultry Director.
- 7. All poultry is required to have an identifying leg band (name, numbers, or combination of these)


